#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Wow, what a year!

The second year of a two-year term is often the best—after going through a full year cycle, I finally felt like I had a good understanding of the responsibilities of the job and can relax a bit and enjoy it. Needless to say that logic didn't apply this time. Pastor Donna's decision to take a leave from call at the end of 2010 changed my job description dramatically and has set all of us on a journey into the unknown.

As with many journeys, this one began with no small amount of trepidation. Thankfully, Bishop Freiheit and his staff at the Synod office quickly shared the process by which GSLC will find a new pastor. They also appointed Pastor Paul Balaban to serve as our Interim Pastor. Pastor Paul stepped into the job and quickly proved himself an excellent "rag in the gas can" (his words—I couldn't have come up with that metaphor!) I am most grateful to Pastor Paul for his hard work and wisdom both in conducting the daily business of the congregation as well as guiding the early stages of the call process. His presence has given all of us the luxury of time to really assess our congregation's needs and find the pastor who will best fit those needs.

The first major task of our call process was to collect data from all members of the congregation to inform our Mission Site Profile. This monumental task was completed brilliantly by a Transition Team comprised of Nancy McCowen (Chair), Gail Block, Kate Nesse, and Rebecka Dickson. These ladies worked hard and fast and deserve our undying gratitude.

Once all of the data was collected, it was up to the Call Committee to translate it into Good Shepherd's Mission Site Profile. The Call Committee is chaired by Bob Clark and includes Larry Curtis, Linda Baker-Skaggs, Ashley Greer, Gladys Freed, Nicole Kyle, David Smith, Linnea DiBerardino and me. This group worked together to create an MSP document that showcases the family atmosphere and commitment to service that we share here at Good Shepherd, as evidenced by the survey data. We submitted the MSP to the Synod office in late May, and as I write this report, we are waiting for a nomination from the Bishop. Although the Call Committee's work is far from over, I would like to thank all of its members for their hard work and willingness to serve. We are all committed to finding the best possible person to be Good Shepherd's next pastor.

If you need a lift, please pick up a copy of the Mission Site Profile and re-acquaint yourself with the wonderful qualities of our congregation. Although this process began with the sad task of saying goodbye to Pastor Donna, it has given us the opportunity to really reflect upon who we are as a congregation. Instead of continuing business as usual, we have been required to closely evaluate what we do, why we do it, and how we

#### YOUTH AND FAMILY MINISTER'S REPORT

"Let them give thanks to the LORD for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for mankind, for he satisfies the thirsty and fills the hungry with good things." - **Psalm 107:8-10** 

Just one block from some of the finest dining in Downtown Champaign a man can be seen pushing a grocery cart full of his belongings. Good Shepherd has partnered with our Methodist brothers and sisters to provide food and clothes to the homeless downtown by using the Salvation Army's **Canteen Truck**. This ministry has allowed youth and adults from many congregations to meet the homeless in our area and learn their names. When Martin Luther died a scrap of paper was found in his pocket that read, "We are all beggars, this is true." As this ministry continues, I hope Good Shepherd will be a part of befriending those who live on the streets.



"Your love, LORD, reaches to the heavens, your faithfulness to the skies." - Psalm 36:5

Last fall I began inviting youth and adults from our congregation to the **Saturday Physics for Everyone** lectures held at the Loomis Lab on the University of Illinois campus. These were wonderful opportunities to learn about breakthroughs in science, but more importantly to sit in awe and wonder about the complex and

mysterious universe God has created. Mike Yaconelli once wrote;

"Predictability and faith cannot coexist...take surprise out of faith and all that is left is dry and dead religion. Take away mystery from the Gospel and all that is left is frozen and petrified dogma. Lose your awe of God and you are left with an impotent deity."

"Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs." - Psalm 100:2

The Lutheran Youth Organization (L.Y.O.) of the ELCA puts together two gatherings in our synod each year. In the fall youth from our synod travel to **Carlinville**, Illinois to worship, study scripture, and share in fellowship with one another. In the spring many of the same youth traveled to **Rend Lake**, Illinois to use their gifts of leadership in small groups. The youth at Good Shepherd have become very active in L.Y.O. and have begun teaching Sunday school classes along with helping lead Thursday night worship.

One of my pet peeves is hearing people say, "The youth are the future of the church." I disagree, they are equipped by God to lead NOW and I am thankful for all the ways our congregation is encouraging them to be involved in serving and leading now.

"But you see the trouble and the distress, and you will do something. The poor can count on you, and so can orphans." **Psalm 10:14** 

We joined our Methodist brothers and sisters in helping out around Christmas time with the **Cunningham Children's Home Bethlehem Walk**. Youth and their mentors dressed up like those in Jesus's day as we led youth from the center in games, crafts, singing, and devotions. This was a powerful experience for both our youth and adults to meet children whose lives are so troubled that they are now orphans in our own community. I am confident that this will become an annual event for Good Shepherd.

"Wash me with hyssop until I am clean and whiter than snow." - Psalm 51:7

Yet another partnership with our Methodist brothers and sisters was the annual **Family Ski Retreat**. This has been a wonderful opportunity for families to participate in devotions, encourage one another in gaining skiing skills, and fellowship with other churches as we take some Sabbath rest. This becomes a key event as we learn to go out on faith taking risks together on the slopes and practice resting in God's presence.

"Are students better than their teacher? But when they are fully trained, they will be like their teacher." - Luke 6:40



I have finished my first full year of **mentoring** at Urbana High School and it has been a wonderful experience. I see my involvement with the Champaign-Urbana Oneto-One Mentoring Program as the best continuing education experience for my growth in youth ministry. I could read books about young people, or I could spend time with them. I am thankful for a congregation that not only supports me in this effort, but is also involved in this program. We have at least two other members who spend time with a student on a weekly basis during the school year. This experience encourages me to expand our current mentoring program at Good Shepherd for those who are going through our confirmation program. We have much to learn from one another and it would be great to see a student grow up learning about Jesus alongside a trusted adult in our congregation. Less of a

focus on confirmation and more of a focus on discipleship is needed as we expand mentoring in the coming year.

This God will not let us stay behind closed doors, but instead sends us out into the world to proclaim what God has done and is doing. #### PARISH WORKER'S REPORT

". . . a foretaste of the feast to come."

Were you at Good Shepherd on Maundy Thursday when we celebrated Holy Communion in Fellowship Hall? About one hundred people gathered together that evening to celebrate the commemoration of the Last Supper with Holy Communion. After sharing communion, the Lord's Prayer was said and a wonderful thing happened. As everyone's voice joined in prayer, it seemed to me that the entire volume of the space was filled with voices. It seemed that there were many more voices than those one hundred present. It was as if the beams and bricks were remembering and echoing the sound of the congregation joining in prayer, as they had many times before when the Fellowship Hall served as our sanctuary. I imagined all those voices and all those prayers from the past added to those voices and prayers present. I imagined that this must be what is meant by the Communion of Saints. It gave me a chill of awe.

We have received instructions from Jesus about how to pray and how to remember him in communion. We are instructed that Holy Communion is a foretaste of the feast to come and that in Holy Communion we are together with all the saints. We receive the body and blood of our Lord and are forgiven our sins. Our debt has been paid, once for all, by the giving of the body and blood of Jesus. The power of this sacrament passes through us, from the past and into the future. In the Apostles' Creed we say we believe in the Communion of Saints. We believe that through Holy Communion we commune with all the saints, past, present, and future. This sacrament connects us all to the one that was and is and is to come. It is part of the essence of the collective life of the Church and provides continuity. It gives history and heart to future hopes and dreams.

There are times when we need to remember that we know who and whose we are. There are times when we need to calm and reassure each other that we know where we began, we know how far we've come, and how we got here. With God's grace we resolve to continue with faith and tenacity. We look to the future with hope and to the journey ahead with confidence.

#### SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT

The service committee had another busy year. The list below gives the highlights of our activities. The members of the Service Committee who made this possible are: Sara Boege, Donna Clark, Nat Ensrud, Tracy Gunderson, Jenelle Keene, Heather Murphy, Betsy Parks, Heather Snapp, Anna Stefan, and Walt Tousey. Plus many members of the congregation joined to help as needed ranging from people taking leadership roles in projects to the many people of the congregation who donated time, food, and money.

Our congregation is very generous with their material gifts, and a number of our projects involved organizing these gifts.

The Christmas Giving Tree resulted in gifts for 60 foster children for LSSI and 20 gifts for men participating in the Safe House and their families. Anna Stefan organized shopping for presents for seniors at the Helios nursing home.

The congregation donated 74 backpacks and many pounds of school supplies to empty tomb to distribute to children returning to school last fall.

The congregation donated \$82 and numerous chick pictures over the Easter Sundays for the Buck-a-Chick event. The money was sent to ELCA Good Gifts where it will be used to purchase chicks for families to raise for food and extra income.

Service Committee designated special offerings this year to ELCA World Hunger and Daily Bread Soup Kitchen (Thanksgiving); LSSI, St. Andrew's Campus Ministry, empty tomb, and the Backpack Program run by Eastern Illinois Foodbank (Christmas); and Crisis Nursery, Men's Safe House, and ELCA Disaster Relief (Lent).

A number of our projects involved food. Food Pantry is the cornerstone project of the Service Committee. It continues to be ably organized by Donna Clark. We've been able to provide food for families in need with once a week deliveries. This is made possible by the many volunteer delivery people in the congregation.

As always Good Shepherd had a sizeable walking contingent for the CROP Walk. The CROP Walk raises money for and awareness of world hunger. Jon Gunderson served as our team captain. Nicole Kyle coordinated media attention for the event. The walk started and ended St. Matthews Lutheran in Urbana on a lovely spring day.

The Service Committee prepared beef vegetables soup and chili for Times Center. We made about 15 gallons at each meeting. 15 gallons is enough for one lunch period at the Times Center.

Good Shepherd provided lunch for Habitat for Humanity build crews both this summer and last summer.

One new project this year was remodeling the LSSI Visitation Room. The LSSI office in Champaign has a pair of rooms used by biological parents to have supervised visits with their children and learn how to become good parents. These rooms had become well-worn and not as welcoming and functional as they should be. The service committee is in the process of organizing remodeling one of these rooms. Heather Murphy and Heather Snapp took the lead in shopping for comfortable and functional seating. Jim Hack is organizing painting the room and has built storage for the room. We hope to have the room complete by the end of the summer.

#### YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT

#### **Youth Committee**

The Youth Committee includes: Kara Greer, Mary Corkery, Tori Corkery, Ruth Meyer, Greg Fisher, Jason Fisher, and Debby Rehn who all provide vital guidance and support for our youth program.

The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church youth have been involved with many events and activities during the last year. The primary focus of these events and activities typically has fallen into one of four main categories: fellowship, fundraising, service, or spiritual growth. The following is a brief summary of our youth program.

The **fellowship events** provide an opportunity to engage in interesting and fun activities. These events included the many JERICHO gatherings - both all-family and age targeted, street/parking lot hockey during the summer, a back-to-school bash, Christmas caroling, the Rally Day, a lockin at the YMCA, Trunk or Treat, the Devil's Head ski trip (with Grace Lutheran and 1<sup>st</sup> United Methodist youth), lectures at Loomis Lab, and a graduation luncheon for our high school seniors.

The youth conduct **fundraising events** to help fund their participation in other events, such as the Carlinville Conference, as well as to provide support to various service organizations. Fundraising activities during the year included the chili lunch, parent's night out (childcare), Newlywed Game, Easter Breakfast, Souper Bowl of Caring, Boot Sale/Apple Festival (pie making), Lenten Supper (with the Fellowship Committee), Crop Walk, and the Monical's pizza day.

**Service activities** throughout the year included participation in the Bethlehem Walk and assistance/support to The United Way, empty tomb, the Daily Bread Soup Kitchen, and the Canteen Run.

**Spiritual activities** provide our youth an opportunity to grow in their relationship with God, as well as develop skills and qualities necessary to become future church leaders. Such activities during the last year included Leadership Lab, leading summer Thursday night worship services, the Carlinville Retreat, the Rend Lake Conference, and Confirmation Camp.

Many thanks are due to the members of the Youth Committee; all those who have hosted youth gatherings in their homes for fun and fellowship; the many volunteers who helped set up, provide food, serve, and clean up for our fundraisers and other gatherings; members of our congregation who attended and generously supported our events; and the parents who transported their young folks to the various activities. #### ARCHIVES COMMITTEE REPORT

This ad hoc committee had its formative meeting on November 17, 2009 which, early on, included Dick Ensrud, Walt Tousey, and Nancy McCowen.

We have continued to meet on a monthly basis since then after adopting, at Pastor Donna Hacker Smith's suggestion, the formal ELCA "The Work of a Congregational Archivist and/or Archives Committee" as a guideline for our project.

We subsequently added the following ELCA documents as supplementary guidelines:

Maintaining the Parish Register

Records Management for Congregations

A Brief Guide for Archives of Congregations

These documents are all available on ELCA websites for the benefit of those members who may want more explanatory detail.

The Parish Register, which is an ongoing parochial record of all baptisms, confirmations, marriages, deaths, communicants, members received and members dismissed, was photographed and electronically transferred to a DVD placed in the office safe with a copy stored off-site for security and long term preservation.

During the past fiscal year ending July 31, 2011, we have managed to concentrate all available records of the congregation from many nooks and crannies of the church into one location on the south wall of the Resource Room. The records are currently in locked supply cabinets that were constructed manually and installed by our very own Jim Hack to whom we extend our thanks for his "over and above" work.

The next step will include scheduling of workshops to catalog, label, acquire appropriate storage containers for the various sizes of storage boxes required, and to arrange in proper sequence in the supply cabinets by Provenance (by group or person that created the record) or Original Order (in the order and filing scheme in which the records were created).

Finally, copy of a "Use and Access" policy, which is currently being customized, will be furnished to the office staff together with an instruction manual including responsibility assigned for controlling authorized additions to our archives.

#### CAROL MANLEY ENDOWMENT FUND FOR YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Carol Manley Endowment Fund for Youth was established to assist in the training and development of the youth of Good Shepherd.

The mission of this committee is twofold: to encourage preservation and growth of the principal balance and to utilize earnings from the fund for the youth of Good Shepherd. This fund will provide distributions to support youth ministries and education beyond the operating budget of this congregation.

Members of this committee are Bob Clark, Chairperson, terms end 12/31/11; Jeretta Hecht, Secretary, term ends 12/31/11; Betsy Parks, term ends 12/31/12; Susan Hinrichs, term ends 12/31/13; and Jonathan Makela, terms end 12/31/13 plus Dana VanDeveer, Treasurer and Pastor.

Two meetings were held this past fiscal year. In December, 2010 Susan Hinrichs and Jonathan Makela were named to the committee with the approval of the Council. Bob Clark and Jeretta Hecht were reappointed as Chair and Secretary.

Action was taken on two requests to supplement the cost for the youth to Rend Lake gathering in February and Leadership Lab in July. Both requests were approved.

An email poll was taken to consider a request from Jason Fisher for help with scholarships to Confirmation Camp which was approved. Total expended for our youth this year is \$2,950.

The committee authorized the Treasurer to reduce the CD due September, 2011 to \$10,000 and transfer \$5,000 to checking in anticipation of expenditures in 2011-2012. The financial report is included.

The May emphasis of the Carol Manley Endowment Fund for Youth included an article in the scroll and a short talk by Bob Clark with the aid of 5 youth who have benefited from these funds. The support of members of Good Shepherd congregation continues to make this fund an important part of our youth ministry.

WELCA at Good Shepherd is thankful for a successful year of fulfilling our purpose statement. We have active members who have contributed their time and talents to support the many ongoing projects and events. WELCA has received much support from the church staff in all of our efforts. The WELCA Board held regular meetings on the first Monday of the month throughout the calendar year to plan and oversee the ongoing projects and events. As fellow members from Good Shepherd, WELCA members unite for service, fellowship, growth and community outreach.

Apple Festival continued to be WECLA's fundraiser. Members of Good Shepherd gathered to prepare 200 homemade apple pies. The pies and donated baked goods were sold at the WELCA Apple Festival event. WELCA is very thankful for the support this event receives from the entire congregation. See Treasurers Report for details of the money earned from Apple Festival. WELCA was not a recipient this year of matching funds from Thrivent. We hope to be able to receive these funds again in the future.

WELCA continued to support numerous projects outside of Good Shepherd. Supplies of calendars were donated to the Lutheran Social Services office on a regular basis. Cancelled stamps are collected and sent to help Stamps for a Living and Deaf/REACH programs. Campbell's soup labels were collected and sent to the Navaho Evangelical Lutheran Mission, Inc. The Good Shepherd quilting group continues to assemble Lutheran World Relief quilts at church on most Wednesday mornings. These women

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work with donated materials, mainly used bed sheets given by church members. The Good Shepherd quilters have made over 2000 quilts for Lutheran World Relief since they started quilting!

WELCA was involved in packing school kits and health kits for Lutheran World Relief. Good Shepherd was the site for the Central Illinois Lutheran World Relief 2010 Ingathering.

The Samaritans of Good Shepherd continue to serve our fellow members of GSLC. The Samaritans prepare and serve meals for families who have had a funeral conducted by our staff. Two women of the church are assigned each month to provide the leadership. Samaritans also sends get-well, baby, and sympathy cards to fellow church members from the entire church membership.

Bible study is the foundation of WELCA. Currently, there are three women's bible study groups, sponsored by WELCA. Ruth Circle meets in Good Shepherd choir room on the third Tuesday morning of each month. Outreach from Ruth Circle consists of adopting two names from the Christmas tree project and organizing Christmas cookie deliveries for the over 80's in our congregation. Anna Circle meets on the first Monday of the month at noon in the church library. Anna Circle serves the" 60's Something" Meals as their regular service project. Rachel Circle continues to meet in the evening on the fourth Monday of each month. These groups combined on June 7th for a salad supper and joint study.

WECLA hosted the annual Christmas Brunch at Lincolnshire Fields Country Club. The bi-annual WELCA Retreat was held in May at the home of Samantha Fisher. The Retreat was a huge success.

WELCA would like to let the congregation know that although we have had a very successful and fulfilling year of doing God's work, we would welcome additional active members. WELCA is blessed to have women who participate in the following areas:
